Conecuh County – Community Assets

- Evergreen (Pop. ~5,000) is the county seat and largest city a natural hub for commerce and services
- Located directly on Interstate 65 easy access to Montgomery, Mobile, and Pensacola with commercial and industrial-zoned properties near I-65 interchanges throughout the county
- Economic Development Pluses
 - Available land across the county suitable for light industrial, agricultural services, and logistics operations
 - Timber and rural land resources support wood processing, eco-tourism, or agriinnovation
 - Existing commercial land near I-65 could be zoned for light industrial or agricultural services
 - Public-private partnerships could involve the city, county, school district, and a private company
- Top Crops & Livestock: Cotton, corn, peanuts, cattle strong foundation for agribusiness expansion
- Potential for public-private partnerships involving the county, city, school district, and private sector investors

Conecuh County – Community Assets

- Low land and labor costs offer a competitive edge for new and expanding businesses
- Natural Resource Base:
 - Rich in agriculture, forestry, and manufacturing industries
 - Strategic location with access to I-65 and rural transportation routes
 - Deep community knowledge in farming, forestry, and equipment operation
 - Ready landscape for agricultural innovation and expansion
- Forestry & Natural Resources
 - Home to portions of the Conecuh National Forest, the region supports timber, hunting, and eco-tourism.
 - Timber processing and wood product manufacturing are natural fits due to local resources and workforce familiarity.

Conecuh County – Community Assets

Conecuh County offers a strong foundation for workforce development through its local technical education programs. The Conecuh County Workforce Development Center in Evergreen provides hands-on training in mechanical and electrical systems, agriscience, medical fields, STEM, and welding — preparing students for high-demand careers across multiple sectors.

Reid State Technical College, also located in Evergreen, enhances this ecosystem with specialized programs in CDL, HVAC, industrial electronics, and more. Together, these institutions offer a unique opportunity to align education with local industry needs.

Strategic Opportunity: Partner with a major agricultural or industrial brand to establish Conecuh County as a regional training and service hub.

Possibilities include:

- Creating a precision agriculture training center
- Launching student internships and certification pathways
- Developing custom workforce pipelines tailored to local employers in agriculture, forestry and skilled trades
- This combination of strong technical training, workforce familiarity with land-based industries, and room for scalable partnerships positions Conecuh County as a launchpad for rural workforce innovation.

Low Population Growth & Workforce Drain


From 1980-2020 Conecuh County has lost approximately 4,300 residents, a 27% population decline (1980 Census: 15,884 residents -2020 Census: 11,597 residents)

Youth Out-Migration

- Many high school graduates leave for college or trade schools and do not return due to a lack of local career opportunities
- Conecuh has a relatively low percentage of residents with college degrees, which can indicate both limited educational return and limited professional employment opportunities

What It Means for Residents

- While hundreds of jobs are available, many are concentrated in hourly/entrylevel roles (e.g., retail, manufacturing, logistics, healthcare support)
- The unemployment rate is moderate but slightly above the state average
- Employment opportunities appear to be growing outside the county as well many residents commute to nearby counties for work




Aging Population


- Over **24% of residents are 65 or older** (compared to ~17% nationally)
- Only about 20% are under 18, showing little generational replacement
- The median age is rising, which puts stress on both the labor pool and public services

Limited Housing & Infrastructure

- Inhibits ability to attract new businesses or workforce
- Realtor.com lists 52 active listings as of June 22, 2025, with a median listing price around \$189,000, and homes averaging 74 days on market



- Affects long-term livability and investment appeal
- Primary care physicians in Conecuh County, AL see an average of 2,370
 patients per year. This represents a 1.78% decrease from the previous year
 (2,413 patients)
- Perinatal care access Conecuh County is a maternity desert with no local delivery hospital or prenatal providers, forcing expectant mothers to travel an average of 23 miles for delivery, with 18% traveling over 70 miles for higherlevel care
- An expanded workforce and strong community investment will help bring essential services, such as healthcare, to the area.



ENHANCING CONECUH COUNTY'S WEB EXPERIENCE AND MARKETING STRATEGIES

Messaging, Visual, and Data Improvements

- Some of the visual media—introductory video on homepage—is outdated and could be remade to be more up-to-date and visually appealing.
- Many of the tabs give essentially the same information, making inefficient use of web space.
- The site shows educational and workforce development initiatives—ACT Ready—but does not show how this has improved conditions in the county. Figures displaying increased education/employment rates could validate claims.
- Better image placement—Images look randomly attached. Lacks flow.

Content/Informational Recommendations


- Elaboration on the individual communities—Evergreen, Castleberry, Repton—to provide a better sense of the area.
- More information about the plethora of natural resources—timber, gas, and oil—that can be utilized by industry.
- A tourism tab should be added, showcasing the interesting attractions the community has to offer.
 - Conecuh Sausage festival
 - Hunting/fishing competitions and services
 - Parks, shops, restaurants



 - 3. Philanthropy through educational land use










- Youth development through multi-generational learning which can lead to increased longevity of life






Dealership Locations


